The UUA Building Loan Program covers only major construction costs but solar installations can be folded in. A small project loan program that will work for solar electric projects is being developed and should be available in early 2008. Congregations that have obtained, or are planning to receive, LEED certification for their green building are eligible to apply for grants of up to \$10,000 depending on the level of certification. Launched on Earth Day in 2007, the Green Construction Award Pilot Program helps defray the costs of LEED certification, but there is some flexibility in how it is used.
